4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: Hello is this Anne? (name of person)

Inquiry: Yes it is.

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: This is Rita from the 4-H office. I have received your inquiry about the program. Is this a good time for us to talk?

Inquiry: Yes.

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: How much do you know about the 4-H program?

Inquiry: Not very much.

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: 4-H Clubs are groups of kids working with their parents/guardians on a variety of exciting and educational projects that promote a wide range of skills. The Children in a 4-H Club learn practical skills such as woodworking, electricity, cooking, sewing, animal care, horticulture, public speaking, and the list goes on. They also learn life skills such as how to make decisions and organize tasks. Adults can attend leader training workshops to learn about the subject matter and how to teach the projects to the club members.

The children become officers in the club. They become president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, news reporter, etc. Eventually they learn to run their meetings by parliamentary procedures.

4-H is actually an educational program. We don't tell the children that. They are having so much fun they don't realize it. There is a \$5 registration fee, per member not to exceed \$10 per family, for the 4-H year. What do think about what I told you?

Inquiry: Sounds great! Where do they meet?

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: They meet in homes, recreation centers, church rooms, schools, etc.

Inquiry: When do they meet?

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: Each club meets when they decide, some meet in the afternoon, evenings, or weekends.

Inquiry: What club can I get my child into?

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: Your child can be a new member in a new club in your area. Do you have friends that might be interested in getting their children in 4-H? A 4-H Club must have five youth or more. Parents/ Guardian are involved in the 4-H club as leaders doing many different jobs.

Inquiry: I can ask them.

4-H Staff Rep/Volunteer: Let's set a date when I can come over and speak with them. I'll go over the program in detail and if they are interested we can do the paperwork and get a club started.

If any member or leader has dropped out of your club write DROP in large, bold letters on the top of the form and return it with the others.
- **Up-date projects and project codes** Cross out projects that members will not be continued and list new ones. Use the specific project name and include the project code and project year.
- Concerns at bottom of sheet Disabilities describe *only if* there are special accommodation needed that you want 4-H staff to know about.

If you have any questions about re-enrollment forms call the 4-H secretary at 344-1234.

2. Forms for New Members and Leaders (blue for members, yellow for leaders/volunteers)
The blue forms collect the same information from new members as is given on the re-enrollment forms. New leaders/volunteers must fill out the yellow Volunteer Application form and return it to the 4-H office. Upon completion of reference checks and signing of the required volunteer agreement the leader will be enrolled.

Animal Feed Boards

Come learn how to make a simple display board of feed samples that animals eat. This is a terrific and fun learning tool for kids to learn about animal nutrition and the nutritional value of feedstuffs. Kits will be available on a club basis to those attending this class ONLY!

Cross Stitch Kits

This is a beginning kit for anyone wanting to learn how to cross stitch. Belinda Cornell, a 4-H Leader, will teach you the basic stitches needed to complete this kit. The kit is complete with thread backing marked, and frame. It will take 4-Hers 2-4 hours depending on age. Four patterns will be able to be ordered at the cost of \$4.50 each at the training.

Venus Fly Trap Project

This is a fun project for 4-Hers to learn about food webs, ecosystems, mutation, selection, niche and habitat. Laurie Smith a 4-H educator from Sullivan County will show you haw to set this Venus Fly Trap project up in a 2 liter soda bottle. Photography Projects

Learn how to take better pictures, how to set up a single photo and six-picture photo stories. How about a "photo study" on lighting or backgrounds or shapes?

This class will cover some fun ideas, including how to make a "Photo Journal." This is a great way to be able to look back on all the fun and what they learned! Each year members take a minimum of 5 pictures of 4-H related activities they were involved in. Members can also have someone take an additional picture of themselves. This training will cover how to take the pictures, how they should be mounted, what type of scripts and captions each picture should have and hints on what to do for a fair exhibit.

Want to learn how to teach your 4-Hers to make centerpieces for the fall and holidays? 4-H leader Pat Reineke of the Middletown Garden Club will do this hands-on training. They will teach the principles of floral arrangements, selection of size, color type of flowers and ideas of what to put your arrangements in. Club Support

4-H Clubs are generally small groups of youth working in conjunction with caring adults on "hands on" projects that involve skills development. Adult volunteers run approximately 98% of these clubs. Typical assets gained by 4-Hers are; leadership skills, educational commitment to achievement; responsive, caring relationships; civic and social responsibility, and healthy lifestyles. These assets are gained through engaging in community service, goal setting, public speaking, and established 4-H achievement criteria.

There are two targeted populations where you may lend your support. Clubs run by grandparents who raise grand children in the absence of their parents and adults running inner city clubs for higher risk youth.

Program Financial Need: groups or individuals to sponsor the costs of project materials for individual clubs especially those in these two target areas. You may also sponsor awards, incentives and group transportation for special learning activities.

Program Volunteer Need: caring adults to share life and professional experience via speakers' bureau, skill workshops, or special event participation.



Advancing Youth Development:

Professional Development Training For 21st Century Youth Workers

A growing youth development movement represents a powerful shift away from a focus on youth problems and deficits, toward a view of young people as resources with strengths and contributions to make. Youth serving programs provide essential supports and opportunities for youth in their communities.

Youth workers need supports and opportunities also, to learn from the best thinking in the youth development field, to share promising approaches, to discuss the values and principles which guide the youth development approach and the barriers which challenge it's application. The Advancing Youth Development training allows youth workers to obtain skills to match the critical challenges of youth development.

Twenty-one non-profit youth-serving organizations, county and state agencies have all expanded their capacity to work with higher risk youth as a result of sending staff to this training. Cornell Cooperative Extension/4-H staff lead facilitation teams of youth development professionals that partner to train these youth workers.

Program Financial Need: Additional resources to expand the audience to educators, police, corrections, foster care, group home and others that work with higher risk youth.

4-H Capitol Days / Cornell Career Exploration

The Capitol Days Program is for 4-Hers who write winning essays on government or citizenship and that are active leaders in the 4-H program. Participants spend two days in Albany meeting with legislators, members of the court system and officials from a variety of state agencies learning how NY State government runs. The legislative process is viewed and youth also learn how a bill becomes law.

Cornell Career Exploration is a three-day program at Cornell University. Participants engage in workshops that include study of diverse subject matter, career exploration and college readiness. Youth experience dormitory life, college level work, the financial aid process, leadership skills, and interactive workshops.


Program Financial Need: funds for scholarships to broaden the number of interested participants.

Connectivity For Urban Audiences

The "digital Divide" remains a reality for many youth in higher risk urban audiences and threatens their ability to compete in tomorrow's workforce. The 4-H Technology Corps will provide portable computing, instruction and application projects for groups within communities that do no have access to computers. Youth will demonstrate programming and expertise in real world work scenarios as developers and end users.

Program Financial Need: Additional support to purchase hardware, Internet access, and transportation for education outreach.





4-H Challenge/Service Day Camp

August Adventures Day Camp serves urban youth in the city of Middletown that are early teens age 12 - 15. These youth are too old for traditional day camps and too young to be employed as camp counselors and need developmentally appropriate fun, learning opportunities. Their camp-times are split between traditional and adventure-based learning camp activities and providing local community service. In fact, these youth learn by doing, and have fun in the process.

A second component serves youth ages 6-12 with traditional camp programming including sports, swimming, trips, arts and crafts, journalism and more. Campers also participate in Mini-Society where they learn entrepreneural skills and how to manage money.

Program Financial Need: funds for scholarships to broaden the number of interested participants. Donated equipment and materials. Bus trip sponsors.
