Guidelines for Conducting a 4-H Club Organizational Meeting

- 1. Arrive a few minutes earlier than the other guests. This meeting should be for adults only if possible.
- 2. As guests arrive make necessary corrections on their leader and member forms (which you already checked before the meeting).
- 3. Begin filling out the Yearly Program Sheet. (See Tool L-1 and Tool 3-Me)
 - a) Finalize the meeting site (home, school, church, etc.)
 - b) First fill in the day of the week, how often the club will meet and time of day for meetings.
 - c) Now fill in all the dates for the meetings. Take in to account days off from school, holiday, etc.
 - d) Next add the projects the club would like to do. Samples of appropriate projects can be shown.
 - e) Now the project leaders will be chosen or this may have been done when choosing projects. Make sure all leaders have each other's phone numbers on their sheet. Record in appropriate place.
 - f) Ask a parent to be the coordinating leader. Explain to the parents that it's not a demanding job. They will be the contact person for you and from the 4-H office. They will disperse information to the other parents.
- 4. At the beginning of the 4-H year include community service and public presentations in the program, if the parents are interested in having their children participate.
- 5. Tell parents what members should bring for the next meeting.
- 6. Explain to the parents, that the children will name their club, become officers and begin working on the program at the next meeting.
